Ministroke and 9 Early Signs of a Stroke

What is a Ministroke?

A 'ministroke' is precisely what it sounds like: a small stroke-like event — but it's something that can have enormous implications.

A ministroke is also known as a transient ischemic attack (TIA), where blood flow to part of the brain is temporarily disrupted, usually for less than 5 minutes, before returning on its own. While these types of strokes do not typically cause permanent damage, the statistics show it is a telling sign that a person is at risk of a major stroke.

 Between 7–40% of patients treated for a blockage-related stroke (ischemic) report experiencing a TIA first. • About 1/3 of people who have a TIA go on to have a more severe stroke within one year.

But a ministroke isn't the only sign you may be at risk of having a stroke.

9 Early Signs of a Stroke in Seniors:

- 2. Difficulty understanding

- 6. Trouble speaking
